School Vision Statement

Thomas Page is a K-8 school with a focus on environmental studies, technology, and 21st Century learning skills. Thomas Page Academy offers an extended elementary school experience for sixth through eighth grade students seeking an alternative to enrollment in a comprehensive middle school. Thomas Page has approximately 400 students and is located on 10 1/2 acres in Cotati. Thomas Page School offers a standards based curriculum, and all instruction is based on the Common Core Standards. Behavioral expectations are based on the Lifeskills and Toolbox curriculum. Monthly assemblies recognize students who demonstrate positive student behavior. School wide procedures and expectations provide a safe and ordered learning environment. The mission of Thomas Page is to develop competent learners - ensuring that every student reaches a high level of academic achievement as determined by state and national standards. We will accomplish this through a variety of learning opportunities and on-going purposeful assessments, committing resources and support to assure this outcome. Each year our goal is for our students to work and achieve while doing their personal best. By doing this, our goal is for more of our students to meet proficient levels of achievement on state and local assessments. Student academic success is supported through a variety of regular assessments and this data is used to plan instruction targeted to all levels of student learning. Thomas Page supports learners through the Response to Intervention model. ELA instruction is targeted to students' needs using Walk to Read groups. Extra targeted instruction is provided with learning center supports in math and writing. Teachers work collaboratively to plan instruction within and across grade levels to build a cohesive instructional program. Teachers are supported in a variety of staff development opportunities. Student and staff safety is a high priority. Thomas Page has a public address system and phone system allowing for instant messaging and communication to staff and parents. New technology has been integrated into the classrooms.

Conclusions from Data:

We have had fewer suspensions than last year and our students, for the most part, feel very safe at school. All staff have high expectations for students and use Tool Box materials to address bullying as well as PBIS as a behavior and school climate intervention. We also have restorative circles and a lunchtime restorative intervention for students who have ODR referrals. The A2A attendance system is used by the district which has increased parent awareness to the importance of attendance. This baseline information will be taken from our PowerSchool data at the end of this school year to compare this year to last year.

Conclusions from Parent, Teacher and Student Input:

The parents and students do feel safe at Thomas Page Academy and the overarching reason why they feel safe is the "no bullying" policy. Bullying has been on the decline and the staff is taking steps to ensure all feel safe at school.

Goal #1 Our school has a physical environment that promotes pride in accomplishment, respect for school property, school safety and student well-being.	
Measurable Objective: By 6/2020, (% or #) will The campus will be clean, physically safe and comfortable and there will be a 10% reduction in the number of accidents and unsafe incidents based on reports collected this school year to be baseline data for future comparisons.	
Action Steps	
1.0	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> a.. Enforce safe traffic flow in the school parking lot b. Provide supervision c.. Communicate to parents the importance of following parking lot procedurers d. Work with the consultants from the Safe Routes to School program to identify safe walking routes for children e. Procedures for safe ingress and egress of pupils, parents and employees to and from school site are enforced. Entry and exit points are monitored before and after school to ensure student safety from danger or harassment f.. Monitor entry and exit points before and after school to ensure student safety from danger or harassment--staff supervision daily g.. Provide visitor passes and engage everyone in the monitoring of unknown people on campus
2.0	<p>Classrooms will be free of clutter</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Backpacks and other items that may cause tripping should be placed in a safe area b. Rooms are organized to welcome an easy traffic flow c. Desks and chairs will be at an appropriate height for each student

Each week a class will take turns doing a litter walk on the campus c. Student leadership will implement a "Keep our campus clean and safe" campaign <p>Remove graffiti and repair vandalism immediately</p>
5.0	<p>Bathrooms will be kept in clean and in good working order</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Students will be closely monitored to prevent vandalism and unsafe activities in restrooms b. Posters will be hung to remind students of good hygiene and respect for school property <p>Drinking fountains will be in good working condition and clean and free of debris</p>
6.0	<p>Provide and maintain adequate outdoor lighting</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Provide two way radios to custodian, office staff, classrooms and campus supervisors
7.0	<p>Routine and Emergency Disaster Procedures</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. The staff reviews and practices the emergency procedure plan. An earthquake emergency procedure system is in place in accordance with Education Code 32282 b. Student lanyards are used to support student accounting and check out in emergencies. c. A plan is in place to allow the American Red Cross to use the site for shelter in a disaster. This plan is coordinated through the district office d. Monthly fire and safety drills are practiced. e. Active shooter trainings and drills are practiced with staff. f. Fire extinguishers are checked annually. g. All classrooms are supplied with an emergency backpack in case of an emergency. h. Active shooter drill is practiced with staff with leadership form Cotati Police Department
